

COVID-19 Vaccination

"To date, 104,901 people have received a COVID-19 vaccine in British Columbia. With notice of a temporary reduction in Pfizer vaccine supply in Canada, we have adjusted our immunization program to match availability. Our focus continues to be on immunizing all those in long-term care, as well as the people who care for the residents, and starting dose two at 35 days."

Community vaccination will now be late March, early April due to this delay. "Supply problems that will slow global deliveries of the Pfizer BioNTech vaccine over the next four weeks will affect B.C.'s COVID-19 vaccination plan "in a significant way," Health Minister Adrian Dix

Starting today, the BC Centre for Disease Control (BCCDC) will provide a vaccine dashboard. Initially, the dashboard will publish provincewide data, but will be expanded to include specific health authority information. This dashboard is in addition to the weekly vaccine report, also available on the BCCDC website.

4.3 million eligible people, 2 doses = 8.6 million vaccinations. We will do this based on your age, starting with our oldest citizens first who are most at risk - through to our young adults.

Government of Canada has committed that every Canadian who wants to be vaccinated against COVID-19 will have access to a vaccine before the end of September 2021.

COVID-19 Immunization Plan

COVID-19: BC's Immunization Plan

Phase 1 (*Current Phase*)

Timeline: December 2020 to February 2021

- Residents & staff of long-term care facilities.
- Residents & staff of assisted living residences.
- Individuals assessed for and awaiting long term care.
- Essential visitors to long-term care facilities and assisted living residences
- Hospital health care workers who may provide care for COVID-19 patients in settings like Intensive Care Units, emergency departments, paramedics, medical units and surgical units.
- Remote and isolated Indigenous communities.



Phase 2

Timeline: February 2021 to March 2021

- Seniors aged 80+ who are not immunized in phase 1.
- Indigenous (First Nations, Métis and Inuit) seniors, age 65 and over and Elders and additional Indigenous communities not immunized in Phase 1.
- Hospital staff, community GPs and medical specialists not immunized in Phase 1.
- Vulnerable populations living and working in select congregated settings.
- Staff in community home support and nurses caring for seniors.

HEALING IN PANDEMIC TIMES

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES, STIGMA, AND COVID-19

New Video, shared by National Collaborating Centre for Indigenous Health (NCCIH), calls for renewed action through the pandemic and beyond to end stigma against Indigenous peoples.

The NCCIH and Northern Health BC has come together to launch a short animated video addressing the ongoing issue of stigmatization experienced by Indigenous peoples in the health care system.

Executive producer, **Margo Greenwood**, Vice President of Indigenous Health, Northern Health, and Academic Leader for the NCCIH. Greenwood notes, *"As the video illustrates, the combination of pandemics and stigma is an old story for Indigenous people. But the pain is always new. And the ill effects can last for generations unless we all, Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples, support each other to take positive healing action. Everyone should feel safe and supported in their communities.*

Healing in pandemic times: Indigenous peoples, stigma and COVID-19 is intended for both Indigenous and non-indigenous audiences. The video reviews key terms; stigmatization, stereotypes, prejudice, and discrimination in an easily understandable way.
