“Today also marks the first virtual Moose Hide Campaign Day. Though we cannot gather in person, we stand together in solidarity to show our commitment to ending violence against women and children.

“To date, 159,887 people have received a COVID-19 vaccine, with 15,684 of which are second doses within British Columbia. Immunization data is available on the COVID-19 dashboard at www.bccdc.ca

“Our B.C. COVID-19 pandemic response is a careful balance — protecting our communities and also keeping open as much as we can that is safe to do so.

“It is about being able to do some things at a moderate level, instead of completely closing most places and activities, as we have seen elsewhere. A walk with a friend allows you to see each other, to have that important connection and still remain safe. This is the modified approach we want to continue.

REGISTER FOR COVID-19 VACCINATIONS FOR MÉTIS ELDERS/SENIORS

MNBC's Ministry of Health wants to ensure that our Métis Elders/Seniors have access to the COVID-19 vaccination in Phase 2 of the Immunization plan, as a prioritized population by the Provincial Health Officer. The COVID-19 vaccines that have been approved by Health Canada are safe, effective, and will save lives. To date, two vaccines have been approved for use by Health Canada (Pfizer and Moderna). This will allow us to contact you or your loved one when the vaccine roll out occurs for Elders and Seniors who are 65+.

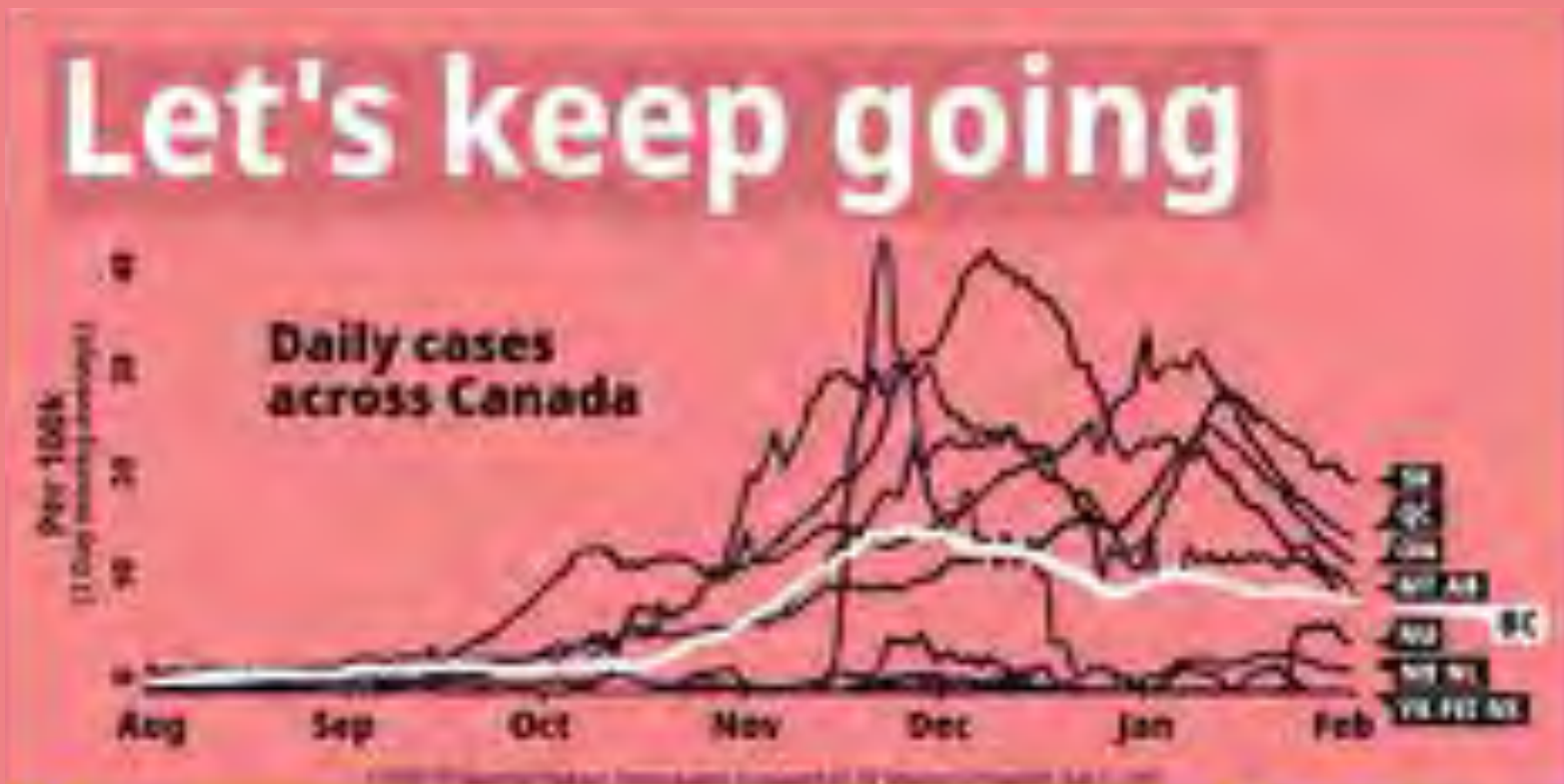

Ask a Medical Health Officer!

In partnership with Interior Health, MNBC has connected with Dr. Carol Fenton, Medical Health Officer to ask common questions

Question: Are we vaccinating children? What happens if other family members are vaccinated but children aren't?

Answer: Currently we don't have a COVID-19 vaccine that is approved for use in children. However, once the adults are immunized the children will benefit from fewer exposures in the community.

Question: Is there a possibility of long-term health effects when taking the COVID-19 vaccine?

Answer: While it's difficult to definitively say whether or not there are long-term side-effects, the medical and scientific community is confident in the long-term safety of the mRNA COVID-19 vaccines. Researchers have been studying and working with mRNA vaccines for decades. mRNA vaccines have been studied before for flu, Zika, rabies, and cytomegalovirus (CMV). As soon as the necessary information about the virus that causes COVID-19 was available, scientists began designing the mRNA instructions for cells to build the unique spike protein into an mRNA vaccine." In addition, cancer research has used mRNA to trigger the immune system to target specific cancer cells. Decades of studying mRNA have shown no long-term side-effects. 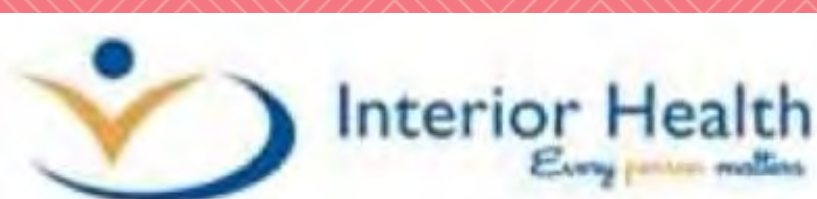
Ask a Medical Health Officer!

Question: Was the development of this vaccine rushed? Is it safe, even though it was developed quickly?

Answer: There are a few ways to answer this, but in all cases, the decision that the medical and scientific community has made is that the COVID-19 vaccines are safe. The medical and scientific community is confident in the vaccine's safety, because of the track record of Canada (and B.C.'s) vaccine approval and safety monitoring system. While it's true that normally vaccines take an average of 10 years to approve, this is because of several factors, most of which have nothing to do with the actual science. One obvious factor is funding - often, scientists have to look for funding after each phase in the development of a vaccine. This delays the work for years. In other words, rather than being able to pursue science, usually scientists take long pauses looking for funding. In the case of the COVID-19 vaccine, this was not an issue. Another reason that vaccine approvals take very long is again tied to funding but in a different way. Normally, the 3 different trial phases are done one at a time, because they don't usually have the funding to conduct them all at once. Instead, this time all three phases were done at the same time with the help of volunteers and sufficient funding. Again, this means that the end data and safety tests are exactly the same as other vaccines that have been approved in Canada. It just took less time. In short, Canada's system has proven time and again that the data necessary to get through the approval process is sufficient to prove safety, even for the long-term.
